

GOOD-BYE TO RECRUITS.

DEPARTURE OF SECOND BATCH FOR HALIFAX.

Enthusiastic Crowd Fills the Station—A Hearty Send-off Given the Boys—Saturday at the Armouries.

A second detachment of 65 recruits left here last night on the 10 o'clock C. P. R. train for Quebec, where they will entrain on the I.C.R. for Halifax. The men went separately direct to the Union Station, and reported there to Col. Otter. Despite the fact that these arrangements had been made, with the intention of preventing a recurrence of the somewhat disorderly scenes which occurred at the departure of the former batch of recruits, the heartiness of the send-off and the size of the crowd at the station was in no way behind that of Friday night. After the train had gone Col. Otter expressed himself as being well satisfied with the result of the arrangements made for the sending off of this batch of men, and stated that hereafter all the detachments will meet in this way, at the station instead of at the Armouries.

Quebec's Quota Fourteen.

Quebec, April 18.—Quebec's quota for the fourth military contingent for South Africa so far numbers fourteen, four more men having taken the oath at the Brigade Office to-day, W. Walling, G. Goudard, W. C. Houston and E. M. Degage, while F. C. Tracey reached town from Sherbrooke, where he recruited, making six in all from that city. Several more Quebecers have taken out papers, but have not yet succeeded in passing the medical examiner. It is reported that at the last moment fifty men of the R.C.G.A. have volunteered their services, as have a large number of those attached to the Infantry School, who are anxious to go to South Africa.

Recruits Leave Kingston.
