GORDON BROWN PASSES AWAY.

A Former Editor of the Globe Dies this Morning.

Brief Sketch of His Career as a Newspaper Man.

At the Time of Death He Was Registrar of the Surrogate Court.

Mr. J. Gordon Brown, Registrar of the Surrogate Court, and formerly editor and managing director of the Globe, died this morning.

By birth, Mr. Brown was a Scotchman. He began his education in Scotland, but at the early age of eleven he came to America.

The elder Brown was a staunch Presbyterian, and the first days he spent in Toronto were devoted to the study of his religion.
