

# MINING ACCIDENTS TAKE THREE LIVES

## Two Others Suffer Injury in Timmins District Mishaps

Timmins, Sept. 13.—The past week has been marked by several mine accidents in this district. Two men were injured at the Vipond Wednesday night, by dynamite, one of them having his hands shattered. The same night, a mucker at the Hollinger was struck under the right arm by a piece of rock, causing injuries which proved fatal. Yesterday, Alex. Middleton, about 27 years of age, working at the Vipond, was caught by loose rock and was rushed to the hospital, where he died about an hour after admission. About 11 p.m. Felix Mechnaud was caught by a fall of loose rock at the Hollinger and killed. He was 32 years of age.

## Diamond Jubilee Observed By Waterloo Congregation

## Pioneer Phrenologist Dies After Jump From Bridge

Professor **Francis J. Cavanagh**, 570 Sherbourne Street, Toronto's pioneer phrenologist, was instantly killed at 8.30 Saturday morning when he jumped from the centre of the North Sherbourne Street Bridge into the ravine. The elderly man was seen to plunge to his death by a number of men and women on their way to work. They sent in calls to police. The man was dead when his body was found in the ravine, a distance of 90 feet below the bridge. The late Mr. Cavanagh had been suffering from mental depression for a number of weeks. Born in Dublin, Ireland, he was 76 years of age, and was widely known as phrenologist. Coroner Dr. Phillip decided an inquest was not necessary, and the body was released for burial. The funeral will be held tomorrow from his late residence.
