

Cancer Society Seeks \$160,000 In Toronto Drive

A drive to raise \$160,000 for the Toronto Branch of the Canadian Cancer Society will start April 1, Norman S. Robertson, campaign chairman, announced last night.

The funds are needed to carry on research projects in Toronto hospitals and to provide fellowships at the University of Toronto for young doctors who are seeking a cure for the killer disease.

The campaign will last through the month of April.

More than 100 research projects are being carried on across the country under the direction of the National Cancer Institute, many of them in Toronto.

Born in England, he was for a time employed on the estate of the Duke of Northumberland. Mr. Walby was one of the founders of the Church of the Epiphany, Bronte, where for 21 years he served as people's warden. He was also one of the founders of St. Cuthbert's Anglican Church, Trafalgar Township. He leaves his wife, one son, Thomas Walby, Oakville, and a daughter, Mrs. Joseph Heffron, Toronto.
