

Dr. Trevor Owen Specialist, 70, In Practice For 37 Years

Dr. Trevor Owen, 70, a specialist in internal medicine in Toronto since 1927, died at his Cawthra Square home Saturday after a heart attack. He had been active in his practice until the day before.

Dr. Owen was a brother of the late Right Rev. Derwyn Trevor Owen, primate of all Canada for the Church of England, and of Professor Eric Trevor Owen.

Born in Calgary, he was educated in Toronto schools and graduated from the University of Toronto Medical School in 1918.

After a year of internship at Toronto General Hospital Dr. Owen practiced in St. Catharines until 1920, later became a resident physician at Johns Hopkins Hospital, Baltimore, until 1925, and spent the following year in the medical unit of the University of London.

On his return to Toronto, he was appointed to the faculty of medicine, University of Toronto, and to the staff of Toronto General Hospital. He also was a consultant in medicine at the Toronto Psychiatric Hospital from 1931 until 1947.

Dr. Owen contributed articles to medical journals, also a section on diseases of the liver, gall bladder and pancreas to Sir John Conybeare's Textbook of Medicine in both its first and eighth editions. He was a Fellow of the Royal College of Physicians, London, and Canada.

He was unmarried, and maintained an office at the Medical Arts Building.
