## LIEUT.-COL. DENISON'S FUNERAL.

Representatives of All Walks of Life Follow the Body to the Grave—The Bells of St. Anne's Tolloed—Buried at Weston

The bells of St. Anne's Church tolled yesterday afternoon as the remains of the late Lieut.-Col. Fred C. **Denison**, C.M.G., M.P., were conveyed to their last resting place at Weston. Rusholme, the former residence of the deceased gentleman, as it was also the residence of his father before him, was the scene of a mournful gathering. The love and respect in which the late Lieut.-Col. Denison had been held was evinced by the large numbers of those prominent in civil, Parliamentary and military life who attended to pay their last respects to the dead. The Senate, the House of Commons, the City Council, the militia of Canada and the clergy and educational institutions were all represented. The funeral was a very large one, and a long line of carriages and private equipages followed the body to the grave.

The magnificent mahogany casket, with its silver facings, was laid out in the large parlor of the family residence and was wrapped about with the Union Jack. Col. G. T. Denison and Majors Clarence and Septimus Denison received those who had called to pay their last tribute to the deceased. It was the wish of the family that there should be no flowers, but a handsome floral pillow, the offering of the Governor-General's Body Guards, of which the late Lieut.-Col. Denison was second in command, was laid upon the casket. Capt. Willberforce, A.D.C., attended the funeral to represent the Governor-General, who sent a wreath of flowers. Commander Law was also present to represent Lieut.-Governor Kirkpatrick.

The services at the family residence, which were very short, were conducted by Rev. A. McLean Ballard, M.A., rector of St. Anne's Anglican Church, assisted by Rev. T. C. Street-Macklem, B.A., of St. Simon's Church, who is a nephew of the deceased. The funeral cortege left Rusholme shortly after 2 o'clock for Weston.

The pallbearers were Hon. John Beverley Robinson, Emerson Coatsworth, M.P., G. R. R. Cockburn, M.P., Senator Ferguson, Col. Grasett, Col. Otter, Col. Mason and Capt. Merritt of the Body Guards.

The chief mourners were the six sons of the deceased, three brothers—Col. G. T. Denison, Major C. A. K. Denison and Major Septimus Denison—and the grand uncle of the late Fred C. Denison, C. L. Denison. Other members of the family and relatives present were Major Delamere, Rev. T. C. Street-Macklem, A. R. Denison (a cousin), R. Denison Fisher, George T.
