pertaining to the succational training of our apprentices and to advise with them upon legal measures sought to be secured. Taking up each of these objects the Pre-sident elaborated thereon, and urged up-on the meeting the various means by which he considered the desired ends might be best attained. He also pointed out that the intelligent han ling of this branch of the business was a legitvaluable source of additional imate and revenue, and gave many useful suggestions to aid his fellow-members in developing the department.
