

MRS. ALBERT SACKRIDER.

Woodstock, April 21.—(Special.)—Rose Foster, wife of Albert Sackrider, resident of the Burgessville district for a number of years, died at the Woodstock General Hospital this morning following an illness of only a few days. Mrs. Sackrider was a member of Burgessville United Church Sunday School and Women's Missionary Society. Her sudden death came as a shock not only to her relatives, but to a wide circle of friends in the community. Mrs. Sackrider is survived by her husband, two daughters and one son.

JOHN TORRANCE JACK.

After only a week's illness, John Torrance Jack passed away yesterday at his home, 30 Maynard Avenue. The late Mr. Jack was born in Stirling Scotland, on April 2, 1844, making him 82 years of age at the time of his death. At the age of 5 he was brought to Canada with his parents, who settled in Elora, later moving to Orillia. Mr. Jack was a resident of Toronto for the past forty years, being a commercial traveller for wire rope. He had business connections and friends in practically every city in the Dominion, and was for 42 years a member of the Dominion Commercial Travellers' Association. He had been retired for the past eight years. He was an elder of Dunn Avenue Presbyterian Church, and was prominently identified with the development of the primary department there.

In 1869 he was married to Miss Sarah Annie Millen of Orillia, who predeceased him eight years ago. Surviving him are two sons, Grant R. Jack, Commissioner of Works for the Township of East York, and Hubert H. of Toronto, and three daughters, Mrs. G. A. Smith of Toronto, Mrs. R. B. Nelles of Niagara Falls and Mrs. J. H. Luff of Montreal.

JOHN MCKENZIE.

Well known on the steel tracks in the time of the Grand Trunk Railway and latterly as grocer, John McKenzie, a native of Paris, Ont., passed away suddenly at his late residence, 104 McRoberts Avenue, Toronto, yesterday. Leaving his birthplace as a boy, he entered the service of the Grand Trunk at the age of 16, and eventually became a conductor. Mr. McKenzie, who was 66 years of age, entered business on his own account sixteen years ago, his store and home being at the same address. A Presbyterian and a member of the Masonic Lodge, he is survived by one daughter, Mrs. Myrtle Fairman, 127 Bastedo Street; three sisters and two brothers.

Maxwell Mongraw, born in Kingston, passed away yesterday at his residence, 464 College Street, following two weeks' illness.
