

FIVE ARRESTS FOLLOW RIOT AROUND JEWISH MISSIONARY

**Missiles Fly at Open-air Meeting Conducted by Rev.
Henry Singer at St. Patrick Street and Kensington
Avenue, Where Thousands of People Gather**

A mob of men, women and children
surged around the precincts of St.
Patrick street and Kensington ave-
nue last night hurling anathemas at
Rev. Henry Singer, the Superintendent
of the Toronto Jewish Mission, who
was conducting an open-air service,
and eventually the foregoing people
were arrested by the police, and will
be charged, some with disorderly con-
duct and others with obstructing.

Thousands of people gathered, and
the five policemen and three plain-
clothesmen had difficulty in arresting
the five named. Some splendid
samples of "Irish confetti" were pick-
ed up by the police, and one had some
hair still sticking to it. "It" was the
size of three hen's eggs, and must

have raised a lump as big as itself
upon the cranium of the person who
happened to step it.

Mr. Singer wonderfully escaped be-
ing hurt, and it was a miracle that
dozens were not seriously injured with
missiles flying about in all directions.
The Jewish element are particularly
annoyed with the intrusion, as they
regard it, of the Superintendent of the
mission. Some of them made particu-
larly strong statements about the
work, and all were worked up to a
great state of excitement.

Samuel Greenberg, when spoken to
about the matter after he had been
liberated on bail, which was supplied
in all cases by Mr. Barnett Weinstein
of 523 College street in sums of \$100
each, said: "I was standing on the
stoop and I heard someone say, 'Look
out, they are going to get you.' The
policemen then said to me, 'If you
come down off the sidewalk I'll lock
you up.' They pulled me off the stoop
and put my hands behind me and
twisted them. They treated us pretty
crudely."

The police force which was present
consisted of P.S. Lewis, P.C.'s Forbes,
Edell, O'Shea, Sinclair, and Officers
Lilly and Ward in plain clothes. "If
I had any help I could have locked
up two more," said Officer Lilly.
